## SECTION TWO: FRAMING AND DISCUSSION

#### **FRAMING**

To collectively advocate and address the pressing issues of child hunger and malnutrition in South Sudan, World Vision South Sudan's communication and advocacy, along with faith and development, hosted a Faith Community Nutrition Dialogue on November 28, 2024. This dialogue brought 15 clergy out of the 20 invitees, including representatives from various faith-based organizations, reflecting a strong commitment among community leaders to tackle these critical challenges. The event provided a platform for fruitful discussion, sharing experiences, and formulating actionable recommendations to improve the nutrition situation for children in South Sudan.

## **DISCUSSION**

The Role of Churches and Faith-Based Organizations in Ending Child Hunger and Malnutrition in South Sudan 1) What are the key nutritional problems in South Sudan? And what can be done from a faith perspective? (5 points or more). 2) More than 1.6 million children under five are expected to suffer from malnutrition in South Sudan in 2024. What is the role of churches and faith-based organizations in ending child hunger and malnutrition in South Sudan? (10 points or more) 3) What are your recommendations to partners, the donor's community, and the world leaders? (5 Recommendations).

CHALLENGES	

## **URGENT ACTIONS**

- 1. Flooding Affecting Farmlands; Raise awareness and sensitize communities on disaster risks and how to mitigate; pass information in time.
- 2. Insecurity: The Church should advocate for social justice and national reconciliation and healing
- 3. National Reconciliation and Healing; Churches and FBOs should advocate for socio-economic justice, Create awareness within families, Promote peacebuilding among different communities.
- 4. Cultural Values: Prioritize children's nutrition over adults, encourage both men and women to actively participate in farming and providing for the family, Address the attitude of idleness by promoting a culture of work. - Use biblical teachings to change mindsets (e.g., Romans 12:2, 2 Thessalonians 3:10, 1 Timothy 5:8).
- 5. High level Poverty and Limited Resources, change attitudes by encouraging a culture of work, such as church farms, Churches and FBOs should collaborate to provide vocational training (e.g., tailoring, bricklaying). Mobilize local resources. 6. Poor Health; Strengthen local health facilities to offer nutrition services in communities and enable many communicates to access them
- 7. Poor Socio-Economic Status and Low-Level Education and lack of political will; Advocate for the diversification of natural resources and agricultural allocations, Promote policy advocacy for equality and equity in government support and resource distribution regardless of political affiliations or geography
- 8. Poor Feeding Practices: Advocate for farming and good nutrition awareness, integrate these messages into sermons and empower church workers to promote these practices.

Moreover, Churches are committed:

Encouraging Large-Scale Agriculture, Coordinating Agricultural Tools and Implementation, Community Engagement in Food Production, Establishing and Supporting Feeding Centers, Sensitizing on Good Hygiene Practices, Supporting Vulnerable Populations, Advocating for Socio-Economic Justice, Transforming Cultural Values, Imparting Vocational Skills.

OVERALL SUMMARY  The Faith-based Nutrition Dialogue started at 10:00 with a warm welcome from World Vision South Sudan Operations Director, Dorance Cooper, who outlined the expectations of the dialogue. Following the introduction, Dr. Sam Onapa led an opening prayer and Bible reflection, setting a spiritual tone for the discussions ahead. The Country Director, Dr. Mesfin Loha, gave an insightful opening remark, highlighting the urgent need for partnership and collaboration among faith leaders to address smalnutrition in South Sudan, Stephne Fibu presented a thorough overview of the current nutrition situation in South Sudan, highlighting the alarming rates of child malnutrition exacerbated by conflict, floods, and economic instability. His presentation paints a stark picture, prompting deliberations on the role churches and faith-based organizations can play in mitigating these challenges.  Pr. Lam Duop Lam then presented on the role of faith leaders in the Faith Community Nutrition Dialogue (FCND), emphasizing their unique position to influence and mobilize communities towards better nutritional practices and support. Following suit, Ronald Ngetich delivered an engaging presentation on the Enough Campaign, an intive that aims to mobilize the government, partners, and community to commit more funding and support to addressing food insecurity and promoting sustainable nutrition practices. After the presentations, the dialogue transitioned into group discussions, which lasted for a significant 40 minutes. Key themes emerged, including the importance of faith communities educating their congregants about nutrition, advocating for policy changes, and mobilizing resources to support vulnerable families.
