#### **ADDITIONAL DETAIL ON PARTICIPATION DIVERSITY**

The dialogue session for Chilim'bondo AP was participated by 15 adolescents. Among them, 7 were most vulnerable children, and 3 children were living with some disabilities. 4 children were reported to have come from socially excluded households within the community, while 2 came from local leaders' households.

# **SECTION TWO: FRAMING**

The children malnutrition dialogue sessions focused on how children understand hunger and malnutrition. Children discussed on what they know are definitions of hunger and malnutrition. They also discussed correlation that is between hunger and malnutrition. The children dialogue session also created a friendly platform for children to voice out how hunger and malnutrition affect them in their daily lives and how they impact on their long term goals. The dialogue also allowed the children to provide their views on what they believe can be solutions to help reducing hunger and malnutrition especially among themselves.				

## **SECTION THREE: CHILDREN'S WORKSHOP OUTCOMES**

## **CHALLENGES**

- i. They said that hunger and malnutrition force them to think beyond their capacity on how they are to grow and develop in their communities with high levels of food securities
- ii. They reported that hunger and malnutrition disturbs them to prepare for their school
- iii. We are forced to be absent and sometimes drop out from school because of hunger and malnutrition
- iv. Sometimes our parents tradeoff our education with piece work for food because of hunger and malnutrition

### **URGENT RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ACTION**

- a. The children said that establishing farm input selling centers within the community so that parents of the children can access the farm inputs at low costs
- b. Children requested Office bearers and NGOs to continue and scaling up distribution of food and other relief items to their community
- c. They suggested that office of education should provide comprehensive trainings to teachers for effective delivery
- d. They requested office of agriculture to recruit more agri. Extension workers for the community
- e. They asked government and other NGOs to enhance support their community with business capital to promote income generating activities
- f. They wanted to see WV and other NGOs scaling school feeding programs

## **AREAS OF DIVERGENCE**

There was no significant divergence worth recording.		

## **OVERALL SUMMARY**

he children's nutrition dialogue session provided a platform for participants to share their understanding and perspectives on hunger and malnutrition, their effects, and possible solutions.

#### **Key Outcomes:**

Understanding Hunger and Malnutrition: Children demonstrated insightful definitions of hunger, linking it to food unavailability, lack of farm inputs, and limited rains. Malnutrition was described as the absence of the six food groups, stunted growth, body weakness, and abnormal body weight and size.
Correlation Between Hunger and Malnutrition: Children identified that hunger leads to unmet nutritional needs and weak

immunity, which are precursors to malnutrition.

Effects on Their Lives: Participants shared how hunger and malnutrition disrupt their education, force them to think beyond their capacity for survival, and compel parents to prioritize food over education.

Próposed Solutions: Śuggestions included establishing affordable farm input centers, scaling food relief efforts, training teachers, recruiting agricultural extension workers, supporting income-generating activities, and enhancing school feeding

This session highlighted the children's keen awareness of these issues and their commitment to finding practical solutions.

## **SECTION FOUR: PRINCIPLES OF ENGAGEMENT & METHOD**

#### PRINCIPLES OF ENGAGEMENT

During the session, children were encouraged to respect each other's views ensuring that no one laughs at someone's view in disrespect. Diversity and inclusivity were also followed.

### **METHOD AND SETTING**

The dialogue session was conducted at a school ensuring a familiar child - friendly environment for children in a non formal set up.

#### **ADVICE FOR OTHER CONVENORS**

1. Ensure children take the leading role of the discussion.
