SECTION TWO: FRAMING AND DISCUSSION

FRAMING

WHO recommends Exclusive Breast Feeding (EBF) during the first six months of life because breast milk contains all the
nutrients required for development, growth and child survival. Timely, adequate, and safe introduction of complementary
foods is critical at six months when breast milk alone is no longer sufficient to meet the nutritional requirements of
infants and young children. Consuming a healthy diet throughout a person's life helps prevent malnutrition in all its forms
as well as a range of diet-related noncommunicable diseases and conditions.

SECTION THREE: DIALOGUE OUTCOMES

CHALLENGES

- Lack of Knowledge on best practices of maternal and child health nutrition.
- Cultural Taboos / Cultural ties preventing women from practicing better nutrition
- Low poverty levels in households
- Maternal complications hindering proper nutrition
- Climate change actionsLack of water for irrigation
- Lack of certified seeds for planting

URGENT ACTIONS

Addressing these challenges requires a multi-faceted approach that combines policy reforms, capacity building, technology integration, and stakeholder collaboration. Here are possible solutions:

1. Establishing Water Pipelines and Storage Tanks

Advocate for increased funding to Agricultural sector: Engage policymakers through evidence-based advocacy to allocate a higher percentage of budgets to make water for irrigation easily accessible.

2. Have more extension officers for proper guidance to farmers

Advocate for increased funding to employ adequate extension workers to help in guiding farmers through successful farming practices.

- 3. Capacity building and empowering of especially Youth and Women groups.
- 4. Introduce more bio-fortified crops while ensuring availability of certified seeds for sustainability
- 5. Introduce dairy farming through improved breeds of cattle, goats and sheep

AREAS OF DIVERGENCE

Most of the issues which were raised during the discussion, participants agreed with them

An accessible and neutral venue was chosen, i.e Chesoi Constituency Development Fund Hall. Despite not having power, there was participation from all members ensuring an inclusive atmosphere was fostered. A report was then compiled, summarizing the challenges discussed and proposed solutions.
